you can make and add your own. How will you make your museum look attractive? For instance, you might want to paint the floor or walls in different colours.


Now start drawing, cutting, sticking and assembling your very own museum.


Remember, your museum will be unique, just like you.

Who would you like to come and visit it?


Assembly Instructions:


Suggestion: before cutting out and assembling your museum, it's best to sketch in the things you would like to include on the walls or floor. It's much easier to draw and colour in while the kit is still flat, than after it has been put together.







3. Stick the two blocks of walls together and finish by sticking the floor onto the flaps marked '**c**'.
